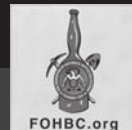




FOHBC PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Great news! A \$5 thousand dollar anonymous donation has been given to the FOHBC Manchester Show to conduct a raffle or raffles during the show (both early admission and general admission). The FOHBC thanks this well known west coast auctioneer for this generous gift. Another GREAT reason to attend the show!

We'll be using this donation to have a \$1,000 raffle on Saturday near the end of the day for the early buyers and eight \$500 prizes throughout the day on Sunday. Dealers setting up at the show are also eligible for these raffles. Vouchers will be given to the lucky winners to be spent at the show or the auction only.

There will also be a separate raffle (above and beyond the raffles noted above) for a \$1,000 bottle to benefit the Virtual Museum. Show Chairs (Michael George and Maureen Crawford) will have the authority to buy a flask or equivalent piece of glass with the money. We will sell six \$1 raffle tickets for \$5. The winner will not have to be present. The person making the \$1,000 donation does not want public recognition.

Of special note, FOHBC officers, show chairpersons and their spouses/partners or children are not eligible for the \$5,000 promotion. Any consultants to the FOHBC are also not eligible. FOHBC officers, show chairpersons, and their spouses/partners or children are eligible for the Virtual Museum bottle raffle.

Thanks are also in order for the volunteers from our membership and our FOHBC Board in helping us round out the event and staff the Federation tables. Please make sure you drop by and say hello. A schedule is posted in the program and online.

Have fun, buy and sell some bottles, catch up with your friends and make sure you enjoy this National show to the fullest capacity. This will be remembered for years.
